Ruskin Memorial

Friar's Crag, with its stunning views of Derwentwater is said to be the departure point for monks sailing to St Herbert's Island on pilgrimage. The viewpoint is one of the most popular places for photographs and was described by John Ruskin as one of the three most beautiful views in Europe.

Located in the market square, ½ a mile from Derwentwater.
